The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America

When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

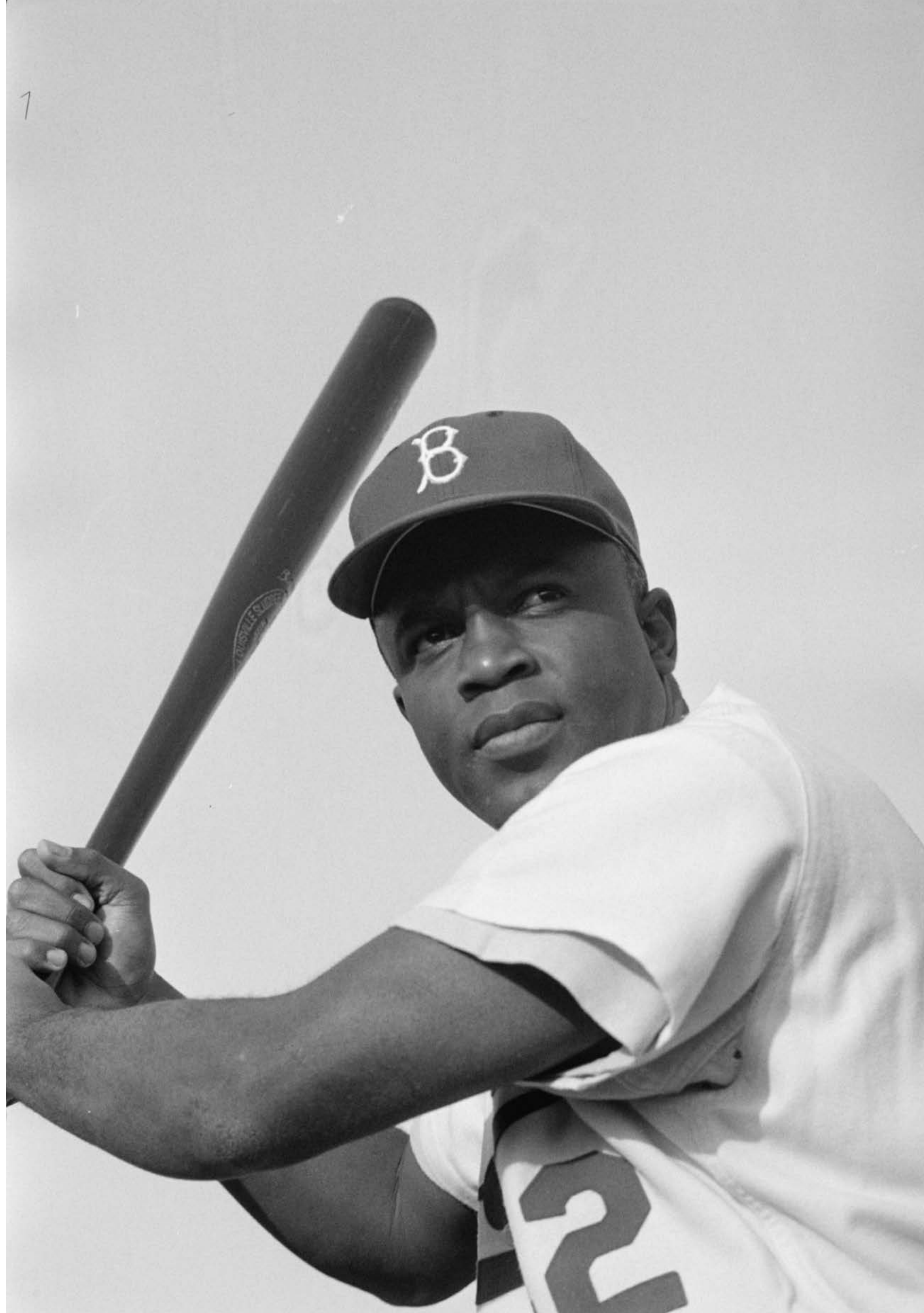
We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness.—That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, — That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Liberty.

That the history of the present United States is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct or indirect consequence the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. — That the King has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public Good. — That he has called together legislative Bodies at places, times, and manners wholly unconstituted, and has endeavored to dissolve them, and to obstruct their Proceedings. — That he has refused to assent to Acts of the most important and necessary for the accommodation of large districts of people, unless those people would assent to a suspension of the Habeas Corpus Act, and other such oppressive and insupportable Measures. — That he has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly firmness invasions of his Rights. — That he has refused to receive by Message the Bills passed by the Houses, and to return them, either with his Assent, or with Objections in Writing, for several times.

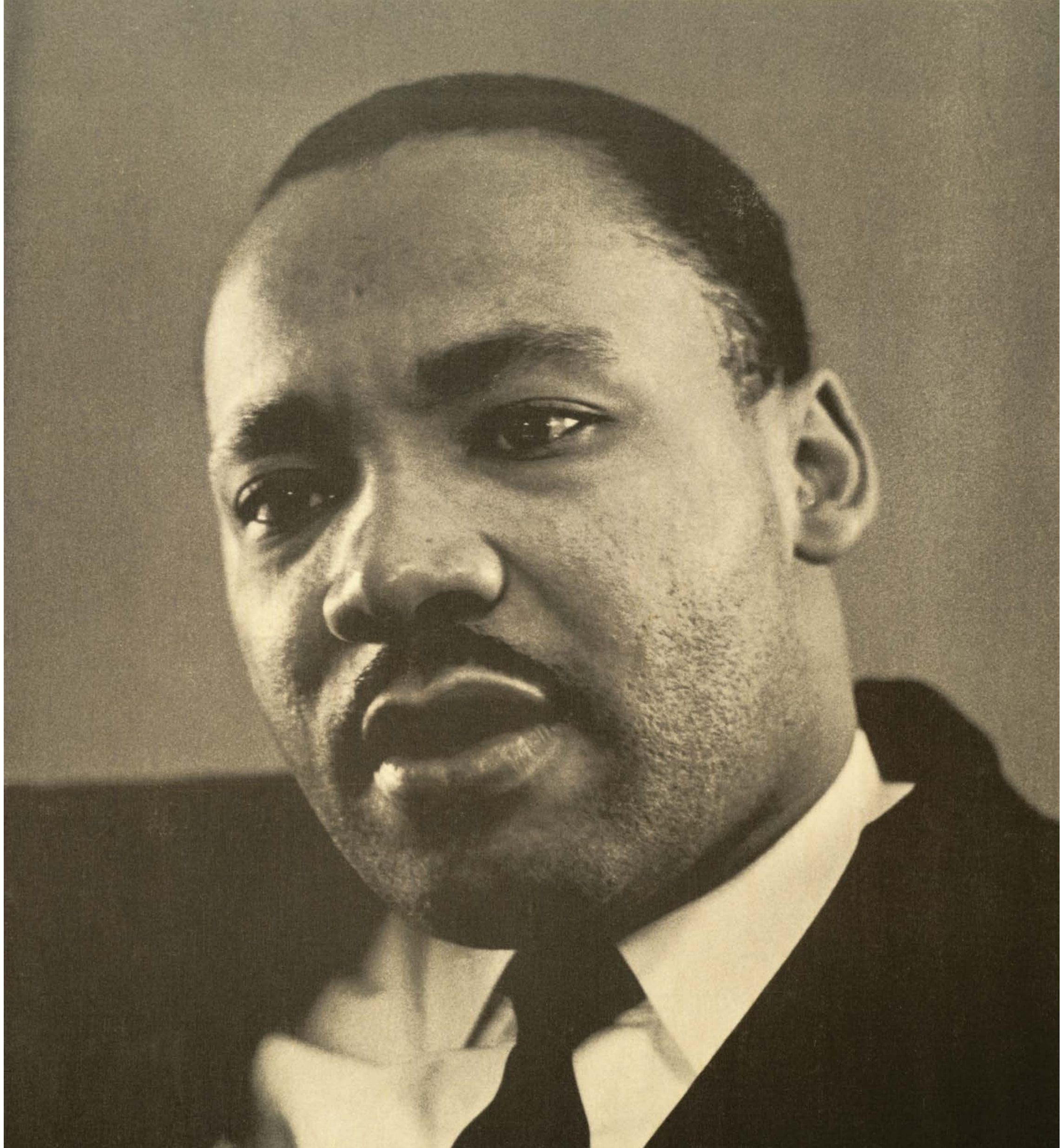














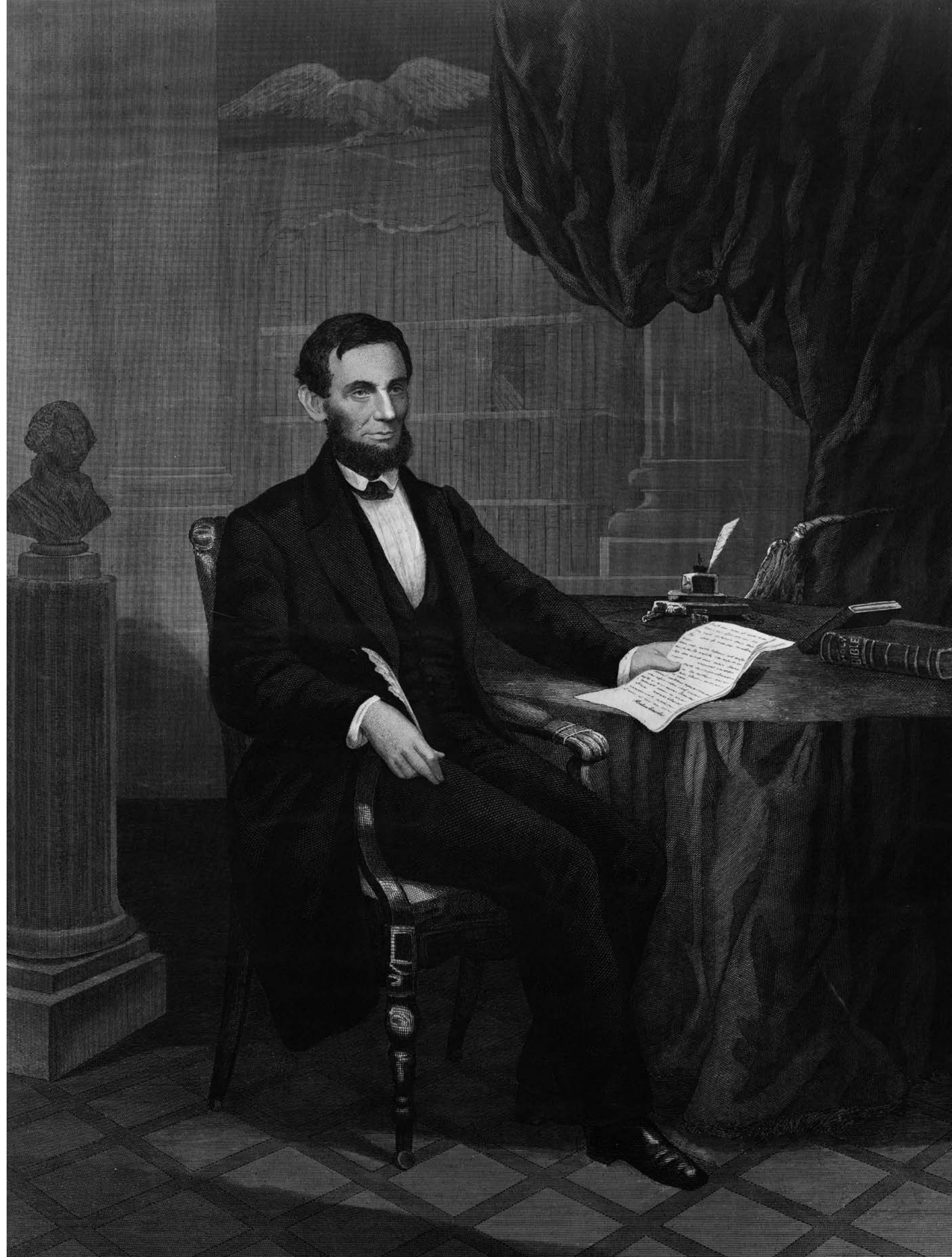




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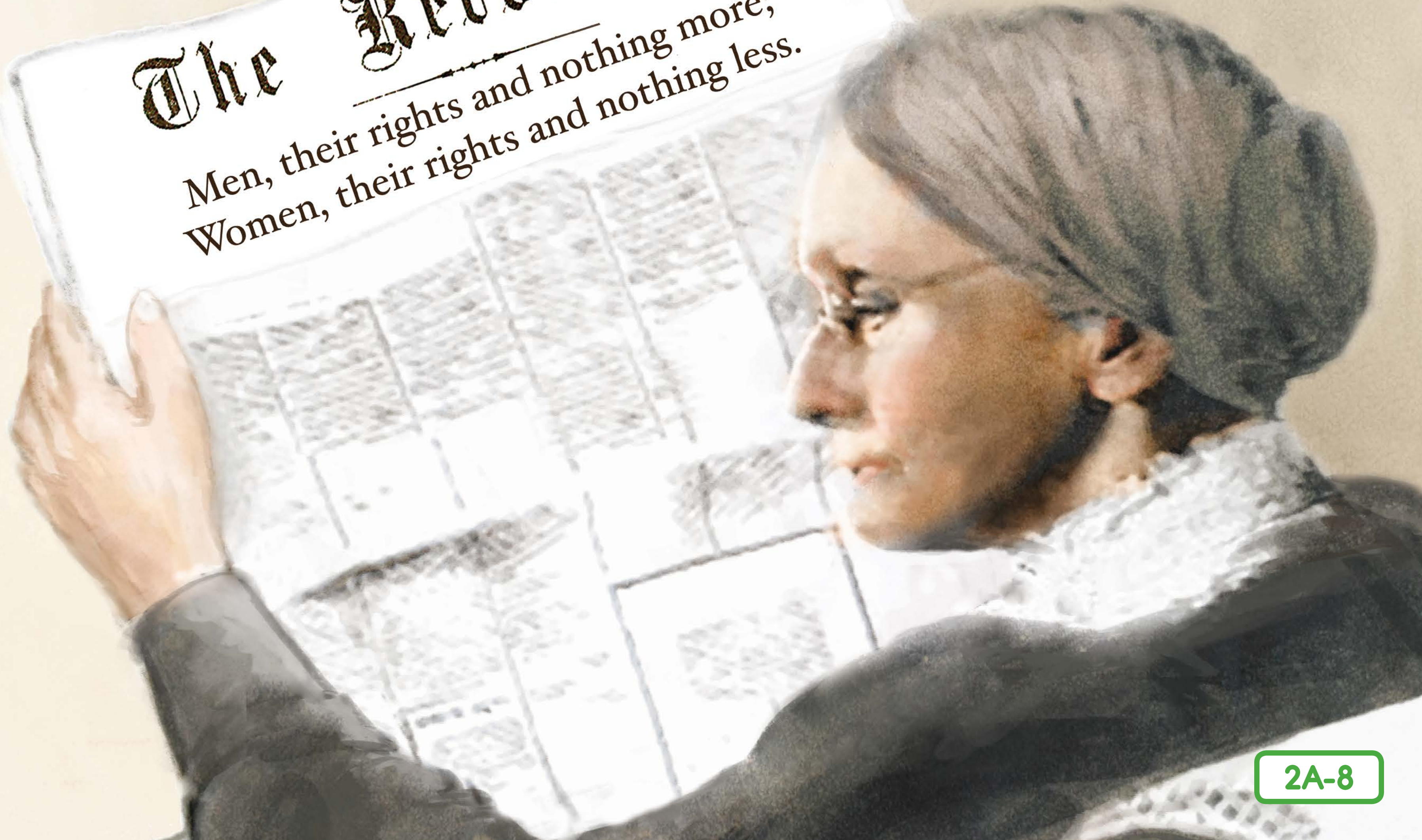

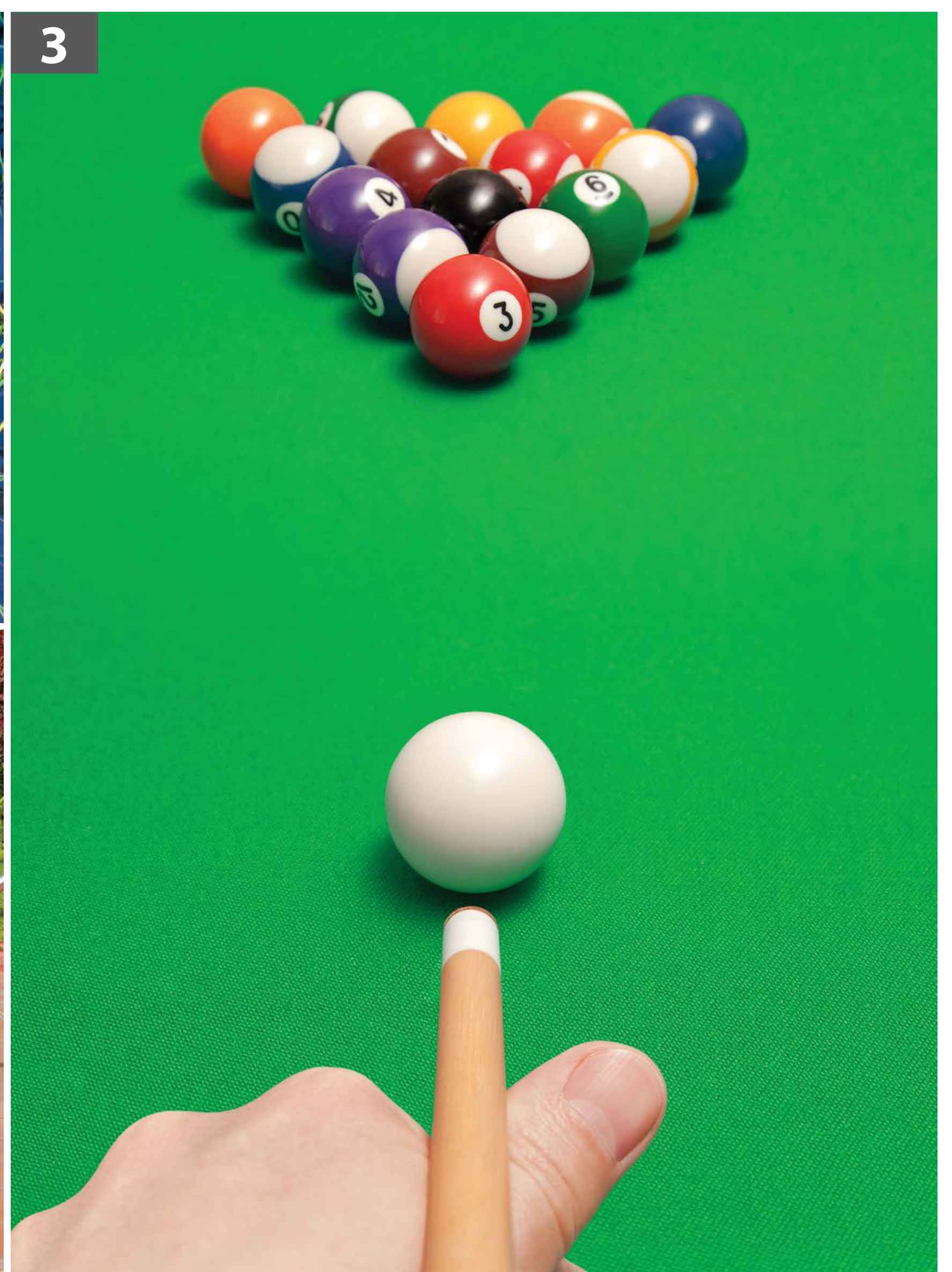




Cast (Poster 1M)

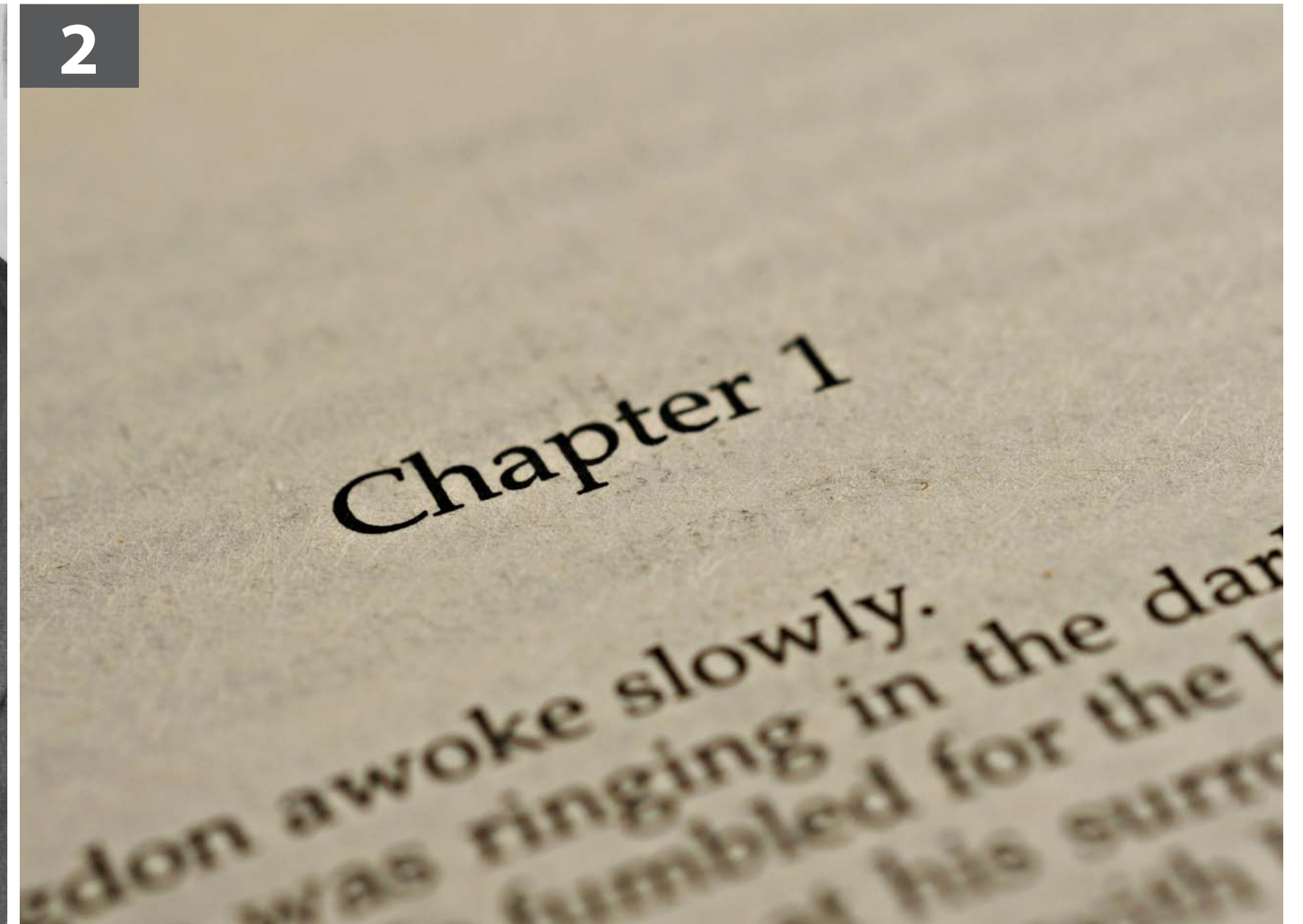
Pool (Poster 2M)
